Introduction



The project “From Goddesses to Leaders – The Evolution of Women’s Rights from Antiquity to Today” explores the historical development of women’s roles and rights, from the civilizations of Antiquity through the Middle Ages and into the modern era. By combining history with mathematics, the project aims to transform historical information into visual and mathematical representations, making long-term social changes easier to understand and analyze.

Historical events and milestones can be represented using coordinates, graphs, and interactive timelines, where the horizontal axis represents historical periods and the vertical axis indicates the level of women’s rights, social status, or participation in public life. In this way, historical evolution can be interpreted as a mathematical function or sequence, illustrating periods of progress, stagnation, or decline.

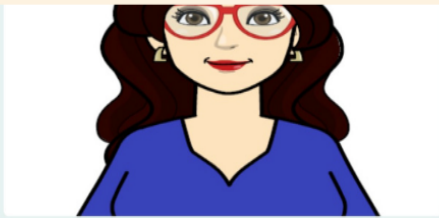




Project partners



This project brought together participants from several countries, promoting cultural exchange, teamwork, and the sharing of different perspectives on the evolution of women's rights throughout history.



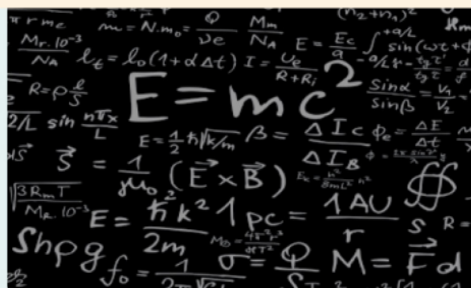

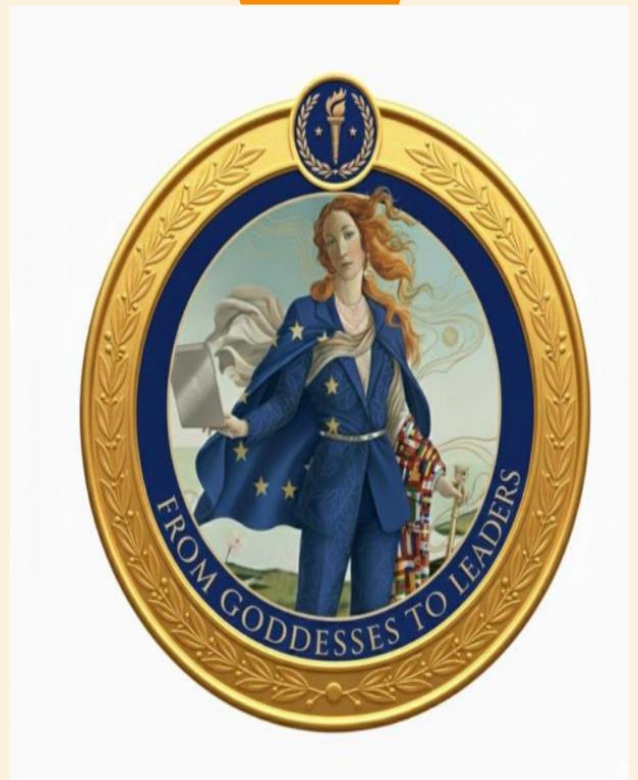
Logo
